## Notes:

1. For the first time in a number of years, all regional competitions included at least two schools/programs.
2. In 2017, participant numbers fell off slightly (36 fewer participants than in 2016); the decline in participant numbers reflects to a large extent a notable drop in numbers in Alaska (from 172 in 2016 to 57 in 2017) occasioned by cutbacks in Russian language offerings across the state. However, the number of schools/programs rose from 58+ to 62+. Nonetheless, total participant numbers for 2017 were the second highest recorded over the last six years.

2. Number of participating schools/programs rose slightly from 58+ in 2016 to 62+ in 2017.
3. The states and regions with the highest number of participants (aggregated across all types of competitions) were Virginia (211), Maryland (181), and New Jersey (159).
4. The lowest number of participants per traditional state/region was in North Carolina (20), followed by Ohio (20), and Tennessee/Mississippi (21).
5. Of recently active Olympiada regions (dating back to 2010) no competitions were held in the following regions: Indiana, Oklahoma, and Washington.
6. Traditional Olympiada medals/certificates were awarded to students as follows: Gold (45.6%), Silver (28.9%), Bronze (13.7%), Honorable Mention (11.8%).
7. Each region (with exception of Ohio) selected at least one regular-category and, where feasible, heritage-category participant to be recognized with the ACTR/SLAVA Award for Outstanding Achievement in the study of Russian. Regular awardees received a book prize in the form of *The Russian's World: Life and Language* by Genevra Gerhart with Eloise M. Boyle (4<sup>th</sup> Edition, Slavica: 2012), while heritage awardees received as their book prize a copy of *The Russian Context: The Culture Behind the Language*, edited by Genevra Gerhart and Eloise M. Boyle (Slavica: 2002). Both books were provided by Slavica at a substantial discount and paid for by SLAVA. List of awardees, along with teachers and schools:

8. An International Olympiada took place in Moscow in early December. A delegation of six US candidates was selected from eligible students nominated by chairs of the various Olympiada regions. MAPRIAL and American Councils for International Education, the principal funders for delegation travel, collaborated on the selection of the delegation. Funding for delegation travel was also provided by SLAVA. The Russian and East European Institute of Indiana University also provided support for travel of the delegation chaperone, Natalia Ushakova.

9. An annual videoconference for Olympiada state/regional chairs was held on December 14, 2017 with nine chairs in attendance.

10. In Spring 2018, we expect the debut of a new regional Olympiada in Western Pennsylvania.

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
