1. In 2015 the rule that more than one school was needed in order to conduct an Olympiada continued to be relaxed on a trial basis. Thirteen traditional high school competitions took place (two of which

incorporated middle school competitors), as well as one ad hoc competitions at elementary level and an exclusively heritage competition for a total of 16 competitions.

2. In 2016, participant numbers improved (59 more participants than in 2015); total participants surpassed numbers recorded in all competitions since 2010.

- 3. The states and regions with the highest number of participants (aggregated across all types of competitions) were Virginia (205), Maryland (189), and Alaska (172). The lowest number of participants per traditional state/region was in North Carolina (5), followed by Minnesota (11), and Indiana (16).
- 4. Of recently active Olympiada regions (dating back to 2010) no competitions were held in the following regions: Oklahoma, Washington. For the first time in many years, an Olympiada will took place in Tennessee for the first time in many years.
- 5. Traditional Olympiada medals/certificates were awarded to students as follows: Gold (45%), Silver (24%), Bronze (14%), Honorable Mention (16%).
- 6. All states/regions employed the new version of Level One materials/procedures that had been developed in 2012 by a committee composed of Ruth Edelman, Lee Roby, Betsy Sandstrom, and Natasha Ushakova; piloted at selected competitions in 2013; and adjusted slightly (based on feedback from states/regions that piloted the materials) in summer of 2013. Revised Level Two materials were piloted at the Maryland competition.
- 7. Each region (with exception of North Carolina) selected at least one regular-category and, where feasible, heritage-category participant to be recognized with the ACTR/SLAVA Award for Outstanding Achievement in the study of Russian. Regular awardees received a book prize in the form of *The Russian's World: Life and Language* by Genevra Gerhart with Eloise M. Boyle (4th Edition, Slavica: 2012), while heritage awardees received as their book prize a copy of *The Russian Context: The Culture Behind the Language*, edited by Genevra Gerhart and Eloise M. Boyle (Slavica: 2002). Both books were provided by Slavica at a substantial discount and paid for by SLAVA. List of awardees, along with teachers and schools:
